Axium, a journal of comparative criticism that publishes the work of Dartmouth undergraduate graduate students, is accepting submissions, on a rolling basis until 2025, for the May inaugural web-based publication. We particularly interested in work on translation and/or literary criticism and theory.

Both 'comparative' and 'criticism' are capacious terms, yet we leave them open to their many potential (and conflicting) potentially meanings on the grounds that truly exciting thought transgresses disciplinary, methodological, national boundaries in necessarily unpredictable ways.

To the extent that these terms guide our standards for submission, Axium looks for the following:

- 1. The comparative should be grounded in the transnational interdisciplinary, and/or multimedia. Examples: cross-language comparison (e.g., translation); comparison of multinational literature of the same language (e.g., Lusophone studies): literary studies with combined geography, history, science, etc.; comparison of a novel with a film, object, music art composition, etc. There are many terms on which submission could stake a claim to being comparative-we encourage creative approaches!
- 2. Criticism should involve the reading and interpretation of literary/artistic/poetic/cultural form. The extent to which a submission constitutes an original intervention into its relevant field(s) of study will be considered.
- 3. A submission should generally be between 1,500 and 8,000 words; exceptions will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Experimentation with mixing sonic, visual, and textual elements is encouraged.
- 4. All submissions must adhere to the standards of Dartmouth's Academic Honor Principle.

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
